MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR GENERAL

From burnout to resilience

Always adapting and in search of new funding.

March 31, 2024 marked the end of a year full of change, challenge, and achievement.

April and May

We hadn't even moved yet but saw more than our share of surprises! The work wasn't yet finished and would cost three times more than initially thought. Our initial budget of \$100,000 was now \$300,000, not counting equipment.

June to October

We moved back into our renovated premises on May 31. We were keen to get to know our new surroundings, and it was quite a learning experience. We also had to adjust to some new realities. The pandemic was followed by inflation, and we now knew that nothing would be the same as before. Two years ago, just 2% of our clients were working people. This year, 27% of food aid requests have been from working families.

Aberrant and not at all normal

We get heartbreaking calls from working people who can no longer feed their families. You can't imagine how helpless and humiliated they feel. We get calls like this nearly every day. Quebec families are forced to choose between paying the rent or feeding their kids. Not to mention the cost of drugs for seniors. Our job is to make them feel welcome, treat them with compassion and dignity, and try to ease their sense of failure.

We've also seen a high demand from newcomers to Canada. Thank goodness for Google Translate! Aside from language, there are dietary practices and restrictions to consider. We do our utmost to satisfy everyone.

Mid-November: everything is falling appart

We're forced to concede that we won't be able to meet demand this year like we have in the past. Donations are getting scarcer, and even Moisson Outaouais has had to cut back on Christmas food aid. So we're looking for other solutions. Demand is way up, and this is the first time in four years our team has felt so burned out and helpless. We've been able to meet demand thanks to a major anonymous donation, individual and corporate fundraising efforts, and various donations from the public. But the work environment remains challenging.

On the last business day before Christmas, we got word that funding was approved for the Tablée populaire and the toilet and shower facilities. I was so exhausted that I saw this as a burden, even though I knew it would ease pressure on food aid requests, and decided not to discuss it until we returned in January. But for the moment, the project was more than we could manage.

January: From burnout to resilience

We reviewed our work practices in January and chose to keep providing first-rate service while putting more focus on our team's mental and physical health. We reduced the number of delivery days from 4 to 2, set aside time to prepare basic food aid boxes, and scheduled two afternoons a week for walk-in assistance so we could serve even more families without wearing ourselves out.

February and March: Abundant opportunities

In February, we were able to buy commercial-grade kitchen equipment to expand our range of food services and, we hope, make up some of our shortfall.

I've always said that our organization owes its success to our amazing team! I'd like to commend the SUPERB work of our FIRST-RATE team of outstanding workers and committed volunteers! We also owe our success and continued growth to our visionary Board of Directors and its unwavering faith in the Dîner pour mieux apprendre mission. And then, of course, last but not least, is the wonderful community that has supported us in so many ways!

A heartfelt thank you to everyone for your vital support.

FOOD AID

General operation

In these challenging times, everyone can use a helping hand to put food on the table. That's why we provide food aid to any family or individual in financial difficulty who lives in the area we serve.

Our basic service consists of one food aid package per month, equivalent to 5 days' worth of food (3 meals a day for each family member).

Walk-in hours

To reduce waiting times, we have introduced walk-in hours. People can go straight to the food bank to get their assistance packages on site.

This new distribution method has meant some logistical changes. We now give out standardized boxes that clients can top up with items from our shelves.

Delivery

To lighten staff workload in the face of evergrowing demand for food aid, we made big cuts to our food delivery service in 2023-2024.

Service tailored to client needs


We've always worked hard to accommodate client needs. For example, we have specialized food aid packages for people who are homeless or "couch surfing."


Food aid distribution schedule





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Providing information

As our food aid service has become a key means of reaching our clients, some organizations have used it to keep them informed on a range of topics (leaflets about Christmas baskets, the winter coat campaign, the dangers of isolation and violence, etc.).

Christmas for everyone!

The generosity of citizens and an exceptionally big donation helped us enhance and improve all food aid services for December and assist 345 families.

One generous donor made it possible to provide 274 children under 18 with a wrapped Christmas gift. We opened up Santa's Workshop, and our volunteer elves came in to wrap all the lovely surprises!

Community-driven project


As a daily witness to our region's growing vulnerable population and their worsening living conditions, Banque alimentaire de la Lièvre has worked for a number of years on a project to create a soup kitchen to provide healthy, balanced meals, toilet and shower facilities, and a washer and dryer in an environment safe for everyone.

We've done this in concert with community stakeholders, all of whom see the importance of such a project in the Buckingham sector. Through this initiative, Banque alimentaire de la Lièvre hopes to improve living conditions for vulnerable people and provide vital support to the community.

Funding confirmed and project begun

At year's end, it was confirmed that CISSS de l'Outaouais had agreed to fund the project under the 2021-2026 Plan d'action régional communautaire intégré et interministériel en itinérance/PARCII (Interministerial Comprehensive Regional Community Action Plan on Homelessness).

In March 2024, we took the first steps to set up a management committee, rent premises, and hire someone to coordinate the project.





COMMUNITY KITCHENS

A year of transition

We were unable to have community kitchens this year due to lack of funding and resources.

We've been working all year to raise money to set up a program of community kitchens and cooking workshops.

At the end of the year, we signed an agreement with the Québec ami des aînés (QADA) program to fund 24 community kitchens for seniors. The project will take place in 2024-2025.

We've approached other donors and are awaiting their response.

What is a community kitchen?



Community kitchens are about more than just cooking! Community kitchens are about more than just cooking! A place where people can share ideas and help each other, they are first and foremost an opportunity to meet, socialize, and make new discoveries with a group of like-minded enthusiasts who prepare food together while finding cheaper ways to eat well.

Four steps are needed for a community kitchen to succeed:

- Planning
- Purchasing
- Preparation
- Assessment (group feedback)

INITIATIVES TO REDUCE FOOD WASTE

Anti-waste initiatives: Unsold food, collection and recovery, transformation, etc.

For a number of years now, we've been collecting surplus food from businesses to stock our community fridge. Under the new program, we've begun to build relationships with farmers and some specialty shops and retailers.

When they have unsold or surplus food, they let us know and we go straight away to pick it up. If there's a big amount, we distribute it to partner organizations and schools.

We sometimes transform food if it's very "ripe." With our new facilities, commercial-grade kitchen, and amazing volunteers, we're doing great things!

Community Fridge

The purpose of a community fridge is to reclaim food that would normally be wasted and offer it to people who are food insecure. The fridge is located outside so community members can access it 24/7, drop off unwanted food, and take what they find useful. Though it's for the food insecure, it can be used anonymously by anyone.

We also rely on the public to help stock our fridge.

This year we've seen a big increase in its use, with a very mixed clientele.

Managing donations with ProDon

To foster a culture of philanthropy in the organization and keep better track of our donors, we launched the ProDon platform in fall 2023.

Philanthropic plan and training

Caméo Consultation helped us develop a philanthropic plan and provided fundraising training throughout the year.

Managing users with Toucan

We've begun setting up a database to manage and oversee food bank users, food aid distribution schedules, and delivery timetables. Toucan is an app developed specifically for food banks by Moisson and Les Banques alimentaires du Québec. Our data should all be entered by late June 2024. We'll finally be able to go paperless!

Community garden

Our community garden has helped improve food baskets and our clients' quality of life by giving them free access to outdoor garden boxes.

Last summer we were given some 300 plants by various farmers and private individuals, which we redistributed to a number of organizations. Some were also planted in outdoor boxes and our community garden.

A helping hand for box lunches

2023-2024:

- An average of 235 per month for the school year

More and more families in our region are experiencing food insecurity, which has a major impact on children. Many parents don't have enough food to pack a lunch for their kids. And for fear of being reported to youth protection, they choose to keep their children at home, which seriously hurts their chances of social and academic success. Kids who have enough to eat are more attentive at school and likelier to succeed. A child will not be stigmatized for having a full lunchbox.


Funding from the Canada Post Community Foundation has helped us buy enough foodstuffs to give all school-age kids a bag of food to put in their lunch box.

Equipment for a sustainable food system

The aim of this project, supported by Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada's Local Food Infrastructure Fund, was to provide equipment and supplies to help the food bank and community kitchens run optimally. It was a continuation of a project funded under the LFIF's previous phase.


This funding has helped us buy a range of equipment to ensure the food bank runs more efficiently (handcarts and trolleys, bins and boxes, etc.) and has gone a long way toward meeting the growing demand for food aid. We've also bought equipment for community kitchens.




